Tornado Safety Checklist

What should I do if a tornado warning is issued?



- The safest place to be is in an underground shelter, basement or safe room.
- If no underground shelter or safe room is available, a small. windowless interior room or hallway on the lowest level of a sturdy building is the safest alternative.
 - Mobile homes are not safe during tornadoes or other severe winds.
 - If you have access to a sturdy shelter or a vehicle, abandon your mobile home immediately. If you need to drive to get to a sturdy shelter, always wear your seat belt.
 - Don't wait until you see a tornado to take action. If a warning is issued, seek shelter immediately.

Watch or Warning?

WATCH Tornadoes are possible in and near the area. Be ready to act quickly if a warning is issued.

WARNING

A tornado has been sighted or indicated by weather radar. A tornado poses imminent danger to life and property.

What should I do to prepare for a tornado?



- Pick a safe room in your home where household members and pets may gather during a tornado. This should be a basement, storm cellar, or an interior room (closet, hallway, or bathroom) on the lowest floor with no windows.
- Watch for tornado danger signs:
 - Dark, often greenish clouds
 - Wall cloud an isolated lowering of the base of a thunderstorm
 - Cloud of debris
 - Large hail
 - Funnel cloud a visible rotating extension of the cloud base
 - Roaring noises

Home Fire Safety Checklist

Cooking Safety



"Keep an eye on what you fry." Stay in the kitchen when frying, grilling or using an open flame.

Fireplaces, Space Heaters, Baseboards, etc.



"3 feet from the heat." Furniture, curtains, dish towels and anything that could catch fire are at least 3 feet from any type of heat source.

Smoking Safety



Never smoke in bed.

Electrical and Appliance Safety



Large and small appliances are plugged directly into wall outlets.

Children Playing



Matches and lighters are locked away.

Smoke Alarms



- Change smoke alarm batteries every year unless it has a long-life battery.
- Replace smoke alarms every ten years.
- Test your smoke alarms each month. If they're not working, they can't get you out the door.

Home Fire Escape Plan



- At least twice a year, practice your fire escape plan with all family members.
- Practice makes perfect! After each fire drill, mark down your escape time.

Hurricane Safety Checklist

Don't wait. Evacuate.



If advised by authorities, evacuate the area immediately. Avoid any flooded roads and/or washed out bridges.

What should I do to prepare for a hurricane?



- Learn about your community's response plan.
- Identify a place you will go in the event of an evacuation.
- Plan your evacuation route or routes to local shelters, register family members with special medical needs as required and make plans for your pets to be cared for.

What do I do after a hurricane?



- If you evacuated, return home only when officials say it is safe.
- Do not use water that could be contaminated to wash dishes, brush teeth, prepare food, wash hands, make ice or make baby formula.
- Never use a generator, grill, camp stove or other gasoline, propane, natural gas or charcoalburning devices inside a home, garage, basement, crawlspace or any partially enclosed area. Locate unit away from doors, windows and vents that could allow carbon monoxide to come indoors.

Watch or Warning?

WATCH Hurricane conditions are a threat within 48 hours. Review your hurricane plans, keep informed and be ready to act if a warning is issued.

WARNING Hurricane conditions are expected within 36 hours. Complete your storm preparations and leave the area if directed to do so by authorities.
